#### THE PROBLEM:

# PG&E PUBLIC SAFETY POWER SHUTDOWN CREATES ECONOMIC LOSSES

- Power outages cost money.
- Businesses lost money.
- People lost wages.
- Medical needs were not met.
- People lost food.
- Businesses lost food.
- Ukiah lost a total of \$8M for one four day shutdown in 2019.
- The 2018 fire season had four times as many red-flag events. If power shutdowns had been in place then, the potential economic losses could have been more than \$50M.

#### THE SOLUTION:

#### LOCAL POWER PRODUCTION

Almost all the power is imported, so emergency preparedness requires local power production.

#### Fossil fueled generators

are a short-term solutions which:

- Don't help the entire community.
- Are investments used only 1% of the time.
- Must be maintained regularly.
- Are noisy.
- Have significant fuel costs.
- Require safe fuel storage.
- May be difficult to resupply.
- Require a permit to install correctly.

#### Lake Mendocino generators

can provide 8% of the total load when there is water behind the dam, problematic in a fire season.

#### **Solar power and battery storage:**

- Can contribute to year-round production.
- Are now cost competitive.



A whole city system (100 MW array and 250 MWh battery) would cost about \$350M. A partial solution would cost less. With some grant funding, annual power costs would be close to our current outlay for power.

- Institutional Investment funds
- Local investors
- California Infrastructure Bank
- PG&E
- Federal & State grant
